



Camp with an Impact

Frequently Asked Questions

What is Camp with an Impact?

CWAI is a multi-day and night summer camp specifically designed for students who are currently in fifth and sixth grades. Loaded with activities, authentic worship, creative teaching and opportunities to make new friends, students get to unplug from their daily distractions and live encouraged and equipped to focus on their relationship with God.

Where does CWAI take place?

CWAI takes place at Camp Adventure in Pierceton, Ind., which is about a 20-minute from WCC. This makes transportation easy and convenient.

What do Students do at CWAI?

CWAI is a classic summer camp in the woods, so in addition to hearing awesome teaching, worshipping and participating in discussions, students take part in classic camp activities, such as canoeing, swimming, sleeping in cabins and tackling obstacle courses.

Who is CWAI's director?

As CWAI's director, Ryan Langeland, pastor of children and students at WCC, is responsible for programming, which includes curriculum, teaching, worship, cabin assignments and the basic flow of the camp. Camp Adventure's staff oversees the facilities and meals.

Who supervises the campers at CWAI?

Safety is the number one priority of the CWAI directors and counselors, as well as the Camp Adventure staff. Students are supervised and cared for 24/7. At check-in, campers are assigned to a same-gender cabin that is supervised by two same-gender counselors. Campers will spend the majority of their time with one of those counselors, including participating in activities and worshipping together. In addition, a counselor sleeps in the cabin with the students.

Who are the counselors at CWAI, and how are they chosen?

Counselors are handpicked by the camp directors. Counselors range in age from high school students to grandparents. Counselors are carefully screened, undergo a background check and must meet the description of a church leader found in 1 Timothy 3:1-7. Counselors complete a training session and familiarize themselves with the curriculum prior to camp.

How are counselors and students grouped at CWAI?

Counselors have an opposite gender co-counselor. Campers are paired into what is known as a "Home in the Woods" group. This group will spend most of its time together (activities, teaching, worship and meals), but the group separates at bedtime and sleeps in separate cabins.

Can I visit or call my student during the week?

For safety purposes, the camp is closed to all visitors, including parents, once the check-in process is complete. In addition, many campers experience homesickness. Keeping them focused and engaged helps alleviate their fears. Allowing parents to visit would only worsen the issue. Phone calls to campers are also prohibited. Staff will notify parents, however, immediately in an emergency.

Can I pick up my student to participate in an outside activity?

Picking your student up during the week for other events, such as sports-related activities, is prohibited. This defeats the purpose of students unplugging to focus on their relationship with God.

How is the distribution of medications handled?

Medications are collected at check in, and their distribution is overseen by the camp medic, who ensures the medications are given at the prescribed times. Campers are not allowed to have medications, including over-the-counter medicines, with them at any time. As-needed medications, such as inhalers, epi-pens, etc., are carried by counselors at all times. A medic is on call 24/7 to assist with medical issues that may arise. All medications must be in their original bottle/packaging.

Should I send money with my student?

Students will not need money during the week, so please do not send it. The cost of the T-shirt campers receive at check-in is included in camp fees.

How can parents communicate with their students during the week?

Parents may send emails or letters to their students. It is recommended that parents send self-addressed, stamped envelopes and paper with their student to make writing and mailing a letter easy. Visits and phone calls are not allowed.

What are the dates and times for CWAI?

CWAI will take place Monday, July 24 (6:30 p.m.), to Friday, July 28 (6:30 p.m.) The closing celebration begins at 6:30 p.m., with departure immediately after. Parents should plan to attend the closing celebration.

How and when do I register?

Registration is now open. Register online at warsaw.cc/event. The registration deadline is July 2. Students who register after all spots are filled will be added to a waiting list.

How much does CWAI cost, and how do I pay?

Cost for CWAI is \$250. Scholarships are available on a case-by-case basis with applications due May 19.

How to Pay

- A \$75 deposit is required at registration to guarantee a spot.
- Pay with a credit card online at warsaw.cc/events. Scroll down to the "Camp Payment" link.
- Payments can be made in installments, but the balance must be paid by July 2.
- Scholarship forms are available at the WCC Info Center and can be printed from the website.
- Scholarship application deadline is May 19, along with the \$75 deposit.
